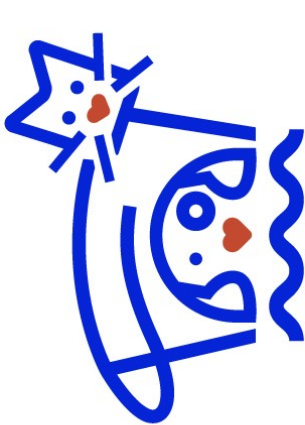

## Vaccination

Of all animal diseases, rabies is the most feared. Most pets are exposed to rabies by bites from wild animals, particularly skunks, bats, raccoons, and foxes. The disease can be transmitted to humans through the bite or scratch of an infected animal, and is nearly always fatal. Vaccination of all dogs and cats is the most effective means of prevention.

This highly contagious viral disease is found wherever dogs are found. It affects the respiratory and nervous system and is often fatal. Primary vaccination should begin at 6-8 weeks as the disease can be contracted at a very young age.

This common contagious viral disease causes severe diarrhea and vomiting in dogs of all ages, but is deadly in puppies.

Coronavirus is highly contagious and causes a milder form of gastrointestinal symptoms than parvovirus. We do not include it in our core vaccinations.

This viral respiratory disease is often partly responsible for “kennel cough” in dogs. Infection can be severe in young puppies. Parainfluenza protection is often included in combination distemper-parvovirus vaccinations.

Canine Adenovirus Type 1 infection causes infectious hepatitis, which can lead to kidney damage. Type 2 can be a complicating factor in kennel cough.

Leptospirosis is a bacterial disease carried by many wild animals. A dog can contract the disease from infected animals by drinking contaminated water. Yearly vaccination decreases the odds of your dog acquiring the disease.

Frequently involved in kennel cough, this bacterial infection may occur simultaneously with distemper, adenovirus type 2, parainfluenza, and other respiratory infections.

Borreliosis, or Lyme Disease, is an infection caused by a bacteria which is spread through the painless bite of an infected tick. Symptoms include fever, lethargy, muscle stiffness, joint pain, and loss of appetite.
